- 3) The slip and cradles are back in order


- 4) The club boat is an added service to attend to your needs on the water



MARINE INSURANCE


S.G.I.C. through its Port Adelaide office, has offered Marine Insurance to members of this club at very competitive rates.

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Sir Joseph Bank's recipe for Pickled Cabbage, April 1769.




"What has Kangaroo Island got that we haven't Had in 25 years?"

DINGHIES

A reminder.

Dinghies under 7 feet may be moored on the Mariner with the approval of the Mooring Master. So, also, may larger dinghies where the owner has a relevant handicap. Larger dinghies must be located on the hard on dinghy rails provided, or taken home. A list of dinghies with approval to moor on the marinas appears in the Club rooms. If you're not on it, you shouldn't be there! To express a personal opinion only, I suspect that the build up of permanently moored dinghies will have to result in a review of this policy as less and less room is available for launching the dinghies of those without Mooring Master approval.

REMEMBER ITS YOUR CLUB SO BE INVOLVED.

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
